aper cranes are so much more than lovely origami. Just ask Amy Baker of Paper Crane Wishes, who says: "A paper crane is a symbol of peace, patience, prosperity, and wealth."

DIY: Flower Centerpiece

This project is quick, easy, and "super cool," Baker says. "This simpler version of making the flowers and gluing them on some decorative branches can really create an eye-catching centerpiece that will stay bright and colorful—unlike real flowers that wither."

SUPPLIES:

Five, 12-inch square pieces of cardstock Hot glue gun

Glue sticks

Scissors

Small decorative branches Mason jar (optional)

STEP 1:

Draw a large spiral across each 12-inch square piece of cardstock.

STEP 2:

Using scissors, cut along the line of the spiral you have drawn.

STEP 3:

Start rolling the paper beginning from the outer end. Keep spiraling the folds until you have formed a rose.

STEP 4:

Holding the rose in place, place some hot glue at the base of the spiral strand. Push and hold the rose in place until secure.

STEP 5:

Hot glue the flowers to the small decorative branches. For a more DIY look, put the branches in a mason jar. To give the look more of your style, add embellishments of your choice!
